The Truth About Change

In 1964, Bob Dylan composed and sang a folk song that resonates with each of us living today — 60 years later — in 2024.

It went like this:

Come gather 'round,
people, wherever you roam.
And admit that the waters
around you have grown.
And accept it that soon
you'll be drenched to the

If your time to you is worth saving

And you better start swimmin' or you'll sink like a stone

For the times, they are a-changing.'

This has never been more true. I can't believe the changes that have taken place since the year I came to America as a young boy. A desktop or laptop computer was not even an imagination; an iPhone or any mobile phone was the stuff of science fiction; the only thing close to social media was a transistor radio! Even cassette tapes and CDs were in the future; we were still listening to vinyl LP records. VHS or DVD movies were non-existent, much less digital streaming services. Yes, the times, they've certainly been "a-changing!"

And not just technology has changed, but also the way we think, work and act in society. Common ideas and thoughts have shifted dramatically, even in the past few years. But friends, we can be so grateful that there are some things that have never changed.

I'd like to share with you four fundamental precepts from the Word of God — four truths that you can count on to never change.

1. God hasn't changed. In Malachi 3:6, the Bible records

God's voice for us to read: "I am the Lord, and I do not change. Whatever is good and perfect comes to us from God above, who created all heaven's lights. Unlike them, he never changes or casts shifting shadows." James 1:17

David who proclaimed about the Lord when he said: "Your faithfulness endures to all generations (Psalm 119:90). Even during the saddest and worst of times, the prophet Jeremiah could look up — filled with hope and full assurance —



2. The Word of God hasn't changed. Isaiah 40:8 tells us that "The grass withers and the flowers fade, but the word of our God stands forever."

3. The Law of God has not changed. Take a look at the words of David in Psalm 19:7-8. David emphasized that point over and over. The law of the Lord is perfect, converting the soul.. and in verse 8, he states that the commandment of the Lord is pure. Something that's pure doesn't need refining. Again, in Psalm 111:7-8 David states that all his commandments (sometimes translated as precepts) are sure. They stand fast forever and ever. My favorite version of the Bible is the New Living Translation: Here it states: "All he does is just and good, and all his commandments are trustworthy. They are forever true to be obeyed faithfully and with integrity."

4. God's faithfulness has never changed. Again it was

and say those words recorded in the book of Lamentations, "His compassions fail not. They are new every morning; So Great is Your faithfulness." (Lamentations 3: 22-23)

The greatest need of each of us during this New Year of 2024 is to let Jesus change our hearts. Then — no matter what changes may occur in this world during this year, no matter what tragedies tear us apart with sadness, or no matter what triumphs we may celebrate with joyful delight — our lives can be built on the unchanging eternal God

In the afternoon, between lunch and the following session, Watson's and Lawson's team prepared a comprehensive team activity competition for the attendees. The much-loved and anticipated T-shirt cannon followed the afternoon session. Different age groups were invited onto the baseball field to try to catch one of the many shirts shot over their heads. This year, the Spartanburg team went all out,

dropping T-shirts from an airplane in addition to firing them from air-compressed cannons, as attendees scrambled to catch the rolled-up T-shirts.

Now that Alive has concluded its final year, perhaps God is calling your church to develop the next youth rally. While we often talk about the youth as the future of the church, they are, in fact, its present. 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"The Power of Your Love"

The 5th annual Awaken Conference, themed "The Power of Your Love." emerged as the most impactful gathering yet, drawing in 120 attendees to the Nosoca Pines Ranch from March 1-3. Despite encountering challenges during the planning phase, the event, organized by Ryan Hodgins, pastor of the Pursuit Worship congregation, and his team of volunteers, was an undeniable success, witnessing a notable increase in participants, including a significant representation of second-generation Hispanics. Hodgins expressed, "During the planning, there were several times when wrinkles almost seemed like they would keep the event from happening. It always takes so much effort to put on anything of impact. But with much love comes great success."

The 90's theme added a nostalgic flair to the conference, culminating in a vibrant 90's glow party on Saturday evening. Volunteers played a crucial

role in the planning and setup, with the dedicated team starting their preparations almost a year ahead, ensuring a seamless execution. Hodgins shared, "The volunteer setup team starts by taking down Pursuit Worship's equipment the Sunday before and loading it all onto a 26 ft. Rental truck. Then Thursday morning we drive down and start setting up at Nosoca at 10:00 am. We work through the day and late in the night."

The main speaker for the weekend, Sam Leonor, a former Carolinian and Adventist Health Mission Identity and Spiritual Care executive, delivered impactful messages throughout the event. Leonor encouraged attendees to "Work as if success depends on our efforts, but trust as if all depended on God." Hodgins emphasized the importance of active involvement as well, stating, "God wants us active and working hard."

Hodgins, reflecting on the weekend experience, shared, "As the band

played and music filled the space, something special happened. My heart was softened, and I was brought to tears by the overwhelming thought of how wonderful it is that God would be willing to use someone like me to influence so many young adults."

Cris Dutra, the Carolina Conference Young Adult/Campus Ministries Director, offered her insights on the event, stating, "At the Young Adult conference, I witnessed hearts awakening as they worshiped God together and listened to Pastor Sam share messages that deepened their understanding of God's love and how to align their hearts with His." Dutra underscored the transformative nature of the experience, highlighting the connections forged and friendships formed among the young participants. "I hope that the ignited passion for sharing God's love will continue to burn brightly, impacting lives throughout the year until the next Awaken."

A SEED IN FERTILE SOIL:

The Spiritual Journey of a Nosoca Pines Ranch Camper

elicia Sanders' week at
Nosoca Pines Ranch
Summer Camp was pivotal,
her first memory of being in a church
environment. She had begun praying
and studying her Bible at age 13, but
while she was at camp, God spoke to
her very clearly. The week culminated

in a performance set to the song "Without Jesus," where 16-year-old Felicia played the main character who was running to the foot of the cross.

That skit reflected her real-life journey. Back home, answering God's call to her heart, she began to regularly attend Lincolnton Seventh-Day Adventist Church in N.C. In 2020, she was baptized. She also put her faith first when it came to choosing a college, enrolling in Southern Adventist University. Initially she was nervous about her new adventure, but she stepped out in faith.

"The more you say yes to God, the greater the heights He brings you to," Felicia says. "I was a seed ready to burst, and I am grateful that I was planted in fertile soil at Southern."

Felicia joined SALT (Soul-winning And Leadership Training), an outreach program organized by Southern in partnership with It Is Written. The program is founded on the theory that all of God's followers are called to be the salt of the earth (Matthew 5:14). Felicia enjoyed going two-bytwo to knock on doors and share the gospel. Her favorite memory was when a particular man answered the door, and his face lit up.

"He was so excited for his Bible study with us," Felicia remembers.

"He had been recently released from prison, and he had some big challenges and some hard questions."

Felicia has participated in many ministries during her time at Southern. She has spent time canvassing through LEAD (Literature Evangelism and Discipleship), which is an

opportunity for Southern students through Georgia-Cumberland Conference. She has taken part in three mission trips, and especially enjoyed collaborating with her peers to write and present their own youth evangelistic series in New Zealand. In addition, she has been involved with LifeGroups, which are small groups on campus aimed at encouraging spiritual growth, and she currently leads a LifeGroup with the friends she made in SALT. She loves collaborating to find ways to apply God's word to the challenges they encounter in their daily lives.

"Coals stay warm together," she says. "Separate one and it goes dim. I know, for many people, LifeGroups can be their anchor point for the week."

Felicia, currently a junior psychology and religious studies double major, plans to pursue a master's degree in biblical counseling. She hopes to use the skills she is developing through her outreach activities to integrate a biblically-founded mental health message into her counseling and help people battle difficulties such as anxiety, depression, and addiction.

From her time at Nosoca Pines Ranch to now being at Southern, Felicia is following where God leads so she can share Him with others. "Being at Southern opens me up to a world of mission opportunities, and for that I am most grateful," she says. "In addition to academics,

I'm being equipped to share Jesus wherever and with whomever the Lord should lead me to!"

FROM DOUBT TO DEVOTION:

Mary Ann's Journey with ShareHim Ministries

his story traces its origins back to 2002, a time that predates my involvement with ShareHim by two years. It revolves around Mary Ann Roberts, a former schoolmate of mine at Mount

Pisgah Academy. The late Bob Folkenberg, former president of the Carolina Conference, had a dream. He envisioned taking laypeople to developing countries where the work of God appeared to be flourishing. His plan in creating Global Evangelism with the Carolina Conference was to equip people with sermons, guidance, and inspiration, allowing them to preach overseas and witness the joy of people responding to the gospel message. The idea was to ignite their passion for evangelism, enabling them to return to their home churches as enthusiastic "sparkplugs" for the cause.

Mary Ann's first participation in Global Evangelism in 2002 took her to Rongo, Kenya, where God blessed their efforts with 640 baptisms. In my early days with Global Evangelism in 2004, Mary Ann joined us in Moshi, Tanzania, and Bulawayo, Zimbabwe. I distinctly remember God's blessings on her site in Bulawayo, resulting in 433 baptisms. Recently, I had the opportunity to ask her about her extensive journey with Global Evangelism (which later became known as SHAREHIM).



She had diligently kept track of baptisms—4,000 in total! Throughout her 16 years of service, she traveled to numerous countries, including places like Central Africa with large, eager crowds, and other regions like Mongolia, Bulgaria, or Cuba, where attendance was smaller.

Mary Ann's journey to Share Jesus wasn't always ablaze with passion. In fact, there was a time when she and her husband David seemed to have

lost their way in their walk with God.

My wife and I had the honor of hearing Mary Ann share "the rest of the story" at her husband David's funeral. Mary Ann had signed up to participate in ShareHIM meetings on the island of Cuba and managed to persuade David, a former dentist, to accompany her. He sat through two weeks of meetings, listening as the Spirit of God worked on his heart. On the last Friday night, Mary Ann's sermon delved into the topic of the Unpardonable Sin, and it ended with a call. To everyone's amazement, the first person to respond was David! The following morning, he was also the first to step into the baptistry. Since then, there has been no turning back!

Funerals are typically somber occasions, but David's was also a source of joy and celebration. You see, God not only blessed Mary Ann with 4,000 precious souls through baptism but also granted her an extraordinary bonus—her husband, David, as her partner in the heavenly eternity with Jesus. Thank God for ShareHIM, and for so much more!
